Pump Me Up: D.C. Subculture of the 1980s Through April 7, 2013

Pump Me Up: D.C. Subculture of the 1980s is the first exhibition to explore the thriving underground of Washington, D.C., during the 1980s, giving visual form to the raucous energy of graffiti, Go-Go music, and a world-renowned punk and hardcore scene.

The exhibition explores the visual culture of the "other D.C.," demonstrating its place in the history of street art as well as that of America's capital city. In the midst of notorious problems with drugs and corruption, D.C. gave

birth to an infectious visual culture captured in the exhibition through posters, graffiti, graphic art, archival photographs, and ephemera. *Pump Me Up* tells a local history from a local point of view, while providing a framework for the contemporary surge of interest in street art and underground graphics.

Shooting Stars: Publicity Stills from Early Hollywood and Portraits by Andy Warhol Through April 21, 2013

Shooting Stars features promotional photographs of early Hollywood film stars alongside Polaroid portraits and black-and-white images by Andy Warhol. Made half a century apart, these two bodies of work illustrate some of the ways photographers have contributed to our understanding of celebrity and fame. The exhibition explores the transition from America's early cinematic star system to the Warholian reinvention of fame, which allowed anyone to become—however briefly—a public personality. How Is the World? Recent Acquisitions of Contemporary Photography highlights a selection of photographs obtained by the Corcoran Gallery of Art over the past few years. The exhibition features works as varied as Paul Graham's dramatic redefinition of street photography, Kate O'Donovan Cook's unconventional self-portraiture, Edward Burtynsky's striking depiction of the oil industry's impact on the land, and Hank Willis Thomas's exploration of the connections between spectacle and African American identity. Graham has said that he uses his camera to answer the question "How is the world?" Seen together, the works on

Roots and Links: Gifts from the Women's Committee of the Corcoran Gallery of Art March 23, 2013—July 14, 2013

For nearly sixty years, the Women's Committee has been one of the key drivers in building the Corcoran's collection of contemporary art. *Roots and Links* brings together a selection of photographs and works on paper in a thematic exploration of identity, portraiture, and self-expression. The exhibition's title, *Roots and Links*, refers to the Committee's foundational role in growing the contemporary collection, and is a nod to one of their most daring and prescient gifts. Kara Walker's *Roots, Links, Inc.* (1997), is a cut paper work that addresses racial stereotypes, and prompts self-examination through an awareness of history and our roles in it. Related issues of perception and representation are echoed in this grouping of diverse work that includes Elizabeth Murray's cartoonish near-abstraction, Lorna Simpson's consideration of ritual transformation, and Cindy Sherman's identity study, alongside revealing self-portraits by Manon Cleary, Chuck Close, Susan Hauptman, and Glenn Ligon. Cynthia Connolly: Letters on Top of Buildings March 2, 2013—June 23, 2013

An alumna of the Corcoran School of Art (now the Corcoran College of Art + Design), Connolly documented Washington's legendary punk rock scene from the 1980s into the 1990s, making portraits of its most committed participants and producing the photography book *Banned in DC*. More recently, Connolly has directed her lens toward commercial displays and details of vernacular architecture, particularly elements of our surroundings in transition or facing obsolescence. Much of this work draws on traditions established by photographer Walker Evans and California artist Ed Ruscha, both important inspirations for the artist. Connolly's series*Letters on Top of Buildings* is rooted in childhood memories of riding in the backseat of her mother's car, with a view across the building tops from Los Angeles's elevated freeways. These typographic signs, which advertise resident businesses, seem like relics of a

bygone era, exemplars of a more colloquial period of commercial marketing and civic pride. The twelve photographs that comprise *Letters on Top of Buildings* are a promised gift to the Corcoran's collection. For more, visit http://www.corcoran.org/lettersontopofbuildings.

NOW Performance iona ROZEAL brown: battle of yestermore Friday, April 5, 2013, 7 p.m.

In 2005, Washington, D.C., native iona ROZEAL brown received a grant enabling her to live for half a year as a guest artist in Japan, where she studied kabuki drama. Her first work of live performance, commissioned for the Performa 2011 festival in New York, *battle of yestermore* extends the allegories of her paintings. *battle of yestermore* is inspired by myth-based genres of Kabuki and Noh theater, as well as hip-hop culture and vogueing, made famous in the Harlem ballroom scene of the 1960s.

Ill Street Blues

March 27 – April 14

In conjunction with *Pump Me Up: D.C. Subculture of the 1980s*, this Corcoran student-curated exhibition displays painted and pasted murals executed directly on the walls of Gallery 31. The styles and techniques on view come from the often-illegal world of street art and graffiti. Ephemeral and often anti-establishment, this kind of work is sometimes at odds with efforts by galleries and art fairs to commercialize it. *Ill Street Blues* aspires to frame street art as vivid yet noncommercial art in a nonprofit space. All of the walls will be returned to white at the close of the exhibition.
