Investigating Arts Integration June 24-26, 2014, 9:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

Through workshops, speakers, gallery investigations, and field trips, educators explore how arts integration uses the fine and performing arts as primary pathways to learning. Music, visual art, theatre, and literary arts are paired with Corcoran works to better understand big ideas, CORE standards, and personal stories.
