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> CORCORAN COLLEGE OF ART + DESIGN PRESENTS Art Cart: Cherishing the Legacy in Gallery 31 September 11–September 29, 2013



WASHINGTON, D.C.—On Wednesday, September 11, Gallery 31 at the Corcoran College of Art + Design will open *Art Cart: Cherishing the Legacy* – an exhibition documenting the work of older artists and designed to educate and inspire students in the arts, health and aging.

Created by the Research Center for the Arts and Culture at the National Center for Creative Aging (RCAC/NCCA, and created by Corcoran faculty member Pamela Lawton and Corcoran Gallery 31 Director of College Exhibitions Joseph Hale, the exhibition features nine Washington D.C. and a parallel exhibit of ten New

York City artists, ages 63-100, whose media include drawing, painting, quilting, installation art, photography, and sculpture. These artists represent a living history of America and their stories reflect periods of great growth and change within society – from the Works Progress Administration (WPA) to the civil rights movement to the women's movement.

Matched with a documentation partner and a student fellow from American University, Howard University, the Tai Sophia Institute, New York University, Columbia University, Pratt and the New School, to organize, label and document their work, each artist's record is then archived at Academic Commons, Columbia University's open source archive. The exhibition opens in NYC on September 5 at NYU's Kimmel Center.

The exhibition grew out of a research study entitled "Above Ground," conducted by the RCAC. The study revealed that artists are in many respects a model of society, maintaining strong social networks and an astonishing resilience as they age. Yet 61% of professional visual artists age 62 and older have made no preparation for their work after their death; 95% have not archived their work; 97% have no estate plan; three out of four artists have no will; and one in five has no documentation of work at all. The exhibition is a celebration of the resilience and tenacity of people who have spent a lifetime making art and is a testament to creative aging and learning through the lifespan.

Art Cart: Cherishing the Legacy includes a selection of works that the artists, their working partners and student fellows documented in the last year, as well as a composite of their oral histories and the launch of a new documentary, "Living the Legacy."

The exhibition opens Wednesday, September 11 with a free opening reception with the artists starting at 6 p.m. A panel discussion featuring artists Lilian Thomas Burwell, Marilee Shapiro, and Carmen Torruella Quander will be held at the Corcoran on Wednesday, September 18th from 7-9 p.m. To register to attend the panel discussion please visit: https://www.eventbrite.com/event/7684098345.
