CORCORAN CELEBRATES WAR/PHOTOGRAPHY: IMAGES OF ARMED CONFLICT AND ITS AFTERMATH WITH SPECIAL PROGRAMMING

Seminal exhibition makes its East Coast debut at the Corcoran, on view June 29—September 29, 2013

WASHINGTON, D.C. — This summer, the **Corcoran Gallery of Art and College of Art + Design**, in conjunction with the landmark photographic exhibition *WAR/PHOTOGRAPHY: Images of Armed Conflict and Its Aftermath*, presents a series of programs that enable visitors to engage with the exhibition on a personal level. Programs are designed to enrich and expand on the many themes and stories about life during wartime, and encourage the personal reflection befitting of the show's emotional nature.

Unprecedented in its scope and ambition and featuring many of the most indelible photographs ever made on the subject of war, WAR/PHOTOGRAPHY revolutionizes our understanding



of this momentous subject and immerses viewers in the experience of soldiers and civilians during wartime. The exhibit brings together images by more than 185 photographers representing more than 25 nationalities, covering conflicts from the past 165 years—from the Mexican-American War through present-day conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. Organized by the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, where it opened in November 2012, *WAR/PHOTOGRAPHY* makes its East Coast debut at the Corcoran as part of a national tour.

Visitors may visit the exhibition for FREE on Saturdays between Memorial Day weekend and Labor Day weekend as part of the Corcoran's <u>Free Summer Saturdays promotion</u>. PUBLIC EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Reflection Room

Located in the exhibition galleries, the Reflection Room provides a space for visitors to share their perspectives, feelings, and reflections on war and the images that have represented it over time. Throughout the run of the exhibition, the Corcoran presents Perspective Gallery Talks, with veterans, photojournalists, art therapists, Corcoran student veterans, and partner groups and organizations that deal with veterans' issues, peace initiatives, journalists' freedom, and other issues.

Major John McCrae's 1915 poem "In Flanders Fields," printed on the walls of the Reflection Room, inspires visitors to write a card of remembrance in response to the exhibition and to pin it on the walls to share with other visitors. In addition, the Reflection Room includes a resource library for visitors to learn more about the themes of *WAR/PHOTOGRAPHY* and the photographers whose work is displayed.

Cell Phone Audio Tour

A free cell phone audio tour is available through the run of the exhibition. This audio tour presents a variety of perspectives on the exhibition's themes, selected works, and historical context as well as explanations of military history, personal stories, and audio clips of media reporting. The audio tour includes insights by curators, photographers, current and retired military and medical personnel, and historians.

Michael Kamber: Photojournalists on War Wednesday, June 26 7 p.m. Members \$8; Public \$10

For his new book, *Photojournalists on War: The Untold Stories from Iraq*, Michael Kamber conducted in-depth interviews with 39 colleagues. The results are candid and honest first-person stories of the war in Iraq. Kamber will review stories and photographs included in the book, before previewing the exhibition *WAR/PHOTOGRAPHY: Images of Armed Conflict and Its Aftermath*.

WAR/PHOTOGRAPHY Opening Event Saturday, July 6

The Corcoran celebrates the opening of *WAR/PHOTOGRAPHY* with a FREE day of programs and workshops themed to the exhibition. Attendees will have the opportunity to participate in a number of events, including a workshop conducted by the Veterans Oral History Project of the Library of Congress, a film screening, and a children's workshop booth sponsored by Tragedy Assistance Programs for Survivors. Admission is FREE and open to the public.

Photographer Louie Palu is well known for his award-winning frontline coverage of war in Kandahar, Afghanistan from 2006 to 2010. He has worked in numerous countries, including Libya, Mali, Pakistan, and India. Palu is currently at work on a project examining the drug war in Mexico and its relationship to the United States. An exhibition viewing follows the talk.

DanceEthos, "Unsung" with Special Presentation by the Telling Project Saturday, July 20

Unsung tells the story of war from the soldiers' perspective. Inspired by letters and interviews of soldiers from the Iraq and Afghanistan wars, the work honors the commitment and sacrifice of soldiers while at the same time serving as a sermon on peace. This performance, choreographed by Artistic Director Tiffany Haughn, originally premiered at Dance Place in 2009.

WAR/PHOTOGRAPHY Gallery Talk: David Wood

As a correspondent, David Wood has covered conflict around the world for more than 35 years, both as a solo journalist and as a reporter embedded with U.S. forces. Since 2001 he has made eight reporting trips to Iraq and Afghanistan. A former conscientious objector, Wood was awarded the 2012 Pulitzer Prize for *Beyond the Battlefield*, his series on severely wounded American soldiers and their families.

Zoeann Murphy is a freelance visual journalist, writer, and teacher based in Washington, D.C.
