Corcoran to display work by select 5x5 artists during the five-week art project

WASHINGTON, D.C. – The Corcoran Gallery of Art and College of Art + Design is proud to announce its participation in 5x5, a temporary public art project organized by the D.C. Commission on the Arts and Humanities. In celebration of the centennial of the National Cherry Blossom Festival (March 20–April 27, 2012), **25 public art installations** will be on view across Washington, D.C. Two of the 25 projects, as well as a related panel discussion, take place at the Corcoran Gallery of Art.

The Floating Lab Collective is a group of locally based artists specializing in public interventions and arts-based actions. The *ReMuseum* is a participatory, mobile experiment that investigates museum processes such as collecting, displaying, valuing, and commodifying objects. Through discussions with D.C. community members,

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the Floating Lab Collective has selected and replicated personal objects of value from homes and rec centers in neighborhoods such as Deanwood, Brentwood, Petworth, and Anacostia. These objects, along with unique stories delivered by their owners, will be displayed in a retrofitted taco truck at the Corcoran Gallery of Art and Edison Place Gallery. These intimate, touching and amusing depictions of place and identity will then be returned to and displayed in their original neighborhoods. Jefferson Pinder: *Ben-Hur* (2012)

Thursday, March 22, 2012; 7 p.m.

Ben-Hur is a time-based endurance piece by Jefferson Pinder in which he continues his investigation of dynamic movement. Accompanied by DJ Tony Tech, six male performers will engage in a performance that tests their strength and physical stamina. Loosely inspired by the galley scene in the 1959 Hollywood epic *Ben-Hur*, the piece demands that Pinder's crew row themselves to exhaustion. Although specifically about the historical, social, and political ideas surrounding masculinity and "blackness," Pinder's *Ben-Hur* also evokes our collective experience of human predicament and struggle. The Corcoran Gallery of Art, a privately funded institution, was founded in 1869. It was America's first dedicated art museum and today is Washington's largest nonfederal museum of art. It is known internationally for its distinguished collection of historical and modern American art as well as contemporary art, photography, European painting, sculpture, and the decorative arts. In addition, a dynamic schedule of special exhibitions is complemented and enhanced by a range of educational programming, which together seek to enrich perspectives, support the local arts community, and encourage interpretation. **The Corcoran College of Art + Design** was founded in 1890 and stands as Washington's only four-year college of art and design, offering BFA degrees in Digital Media Design, Fine Art, Fine Art Photography, Graphic Design, Interior Design, and Photojournalism; a BA in Art Studies; a five-year Bachelor of Fine Arts/Master of Arts in Teaching (BFA/MAT); an AFA in Digital Media Design, Fine Art, Graphic Design, and Photography; and MA degrees in Art and the Book, Art Education, Exhibition Design, Interior Design, Master of Arts in Teaching, and New Media Photojournalism.
