WASHINGTON, D.C.—Beginning this July, the Corcoran Gallery

of Art and College of Art + Design will present a series of cultural programs inspired by *Ellen Harvey: The Alien's Guide to the Ruins of Washington, D.C.* Harvey's new, site-specific project, the latest in the gallery's NOW exhibition series, envisions the capital city in a far-distant future.

Human civilization having long since come to an end, the earth is populated now only by ruins, ripe for archeological interpretation by visitors from another planet. Attempting to make sense of what they find, Harvey's aliens mine the potential of Washington, D.C.—one of the greatest neoclassical cities —as a tourist destination. *The Alien's Guide to the Ruins of Washington, D.C.* is the result.

The Corcoran will offer special programming and events tied to the exhibition, giving visitors and residents alike the opportunity to view the city through alien eyes. Guests will have the chance to visit the exhibition for free on Saturdays between Memorial Day weekend

Join for an intimate evening with the artist as she talks about her commissioned, site-specific project, *Ellen Harvey: The Alien's Guide to the Ruins of Washington, D.C.*, the latest in the Gallery's NOW series.

Ellen Harvey's art explores the pull of desire, the shocks of reality, and the histories embedded in ways of seeing. In work that ranges from painting and drawing to installation and public interventions, Harvey probes the gap between the imagined and actual—art's promise of transcendence versus its reality. Well-known projects include *New York Beautification Project* (1999-2001) for which she illegally "tagged" New York City streets with small, Hudson Riverstyle landscape paintings, and *A Whitney for the Whitney* (2003), for which she laboriously repainted every work in the collection of the Whitney Museum of American Art, creating a purposefully inadequate stand-in for the museum.

Before or after the lecture, tour through the exhibition and take part in <u>Corcoran Uncorked</u>, the Gallery's weekly latenight evening.

NOW at the Corcoran is the Gallery's contemporary art program dedicated to exhibitions and performances by emerging and mid-career artists. It highlights work that addresses issues central to local, national, and global communities of Washington, D.C.
