Coinciding with the Launch of Master of Arts in New Media Photojournalism at the Corcoran College of Art + Design

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Beginning August 11, the Corcoran Gallery of Art and College of Art + Design will showcase works from *Grace Before Dying*, an award-winning photographic documentary by Lori Waselchuk on the groundbreaking new hospice program at Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola. The Corcoran will present *Grace Before Dying* in two parts: a selection of photographs in the Corcoran's corridor from August 11 to September 18 and on September 9 in the Corcoran Rotunda a one-day-viewing of the full traveling exhibition. The artist will deliver a lecture, "*Grace Before Dying*: Connecting Communities Inside and Outside Prison Walls," on Friday, September 9 at 7 p.m. The exhibition dovetails with the fall launch of the Corcoran College of Art + Design's latest degree offering, the Master of Arts in New Media Photojournalism.

Waselchuk's photographs selected for the Corcoran's corridor chronicle the prisoner-run hospice program launched in 1998 at Louisiana's infamous Angola Penitentiary. In documenting the daily life of the volunteers and inmates as they comfort sick and dying inmates, Waselchuk provides a look into how the program fosters a culture of respect and compassion – transforming one of most dangerous maximum security prisons in the United States

into one of the least violent. The Corcoran's Rotunda will display the traveling portion of *Grace Before Dying*, an installation of five 7' x 7' photo and text panels and two 6' x 7' quilts handmade by the hospice volunteers, on view on September 9.

"Lori Waselchuk's *Grace Before Dying* is a fantastic example of the power of photojournalism. The photographer has gone beyond making compelling images and bringing an unseen world into view. She has taken the visual reporting back to her subjects – into prison and hospice communities – and to a greater public," said Susan Sterner, director of photojournalism programs at the Corcoran. "This work connects communities and has sparked dialogue around hard issues."

The exhibition coincides with the launch of the Master of Arts in New Media Photojournalism this fall at the Corcoran College of Art + Design. The vision of the new program, the first of its kind in an art institution, is to train and empower visual journalists engaged in issues of the day and working with an active awareness of their responsibility to

subject and society. Sterner said, "It's all about telling stories in a powerful way and getting them out in front of new audiences."

On **Friday, September 9 at 7 p.m.**, the Corcoran will host Waselchuk for an evening lecture, "*Grace Before Dying*: Connecting Communities Inside and Outside Prison Walls." A reception and book signing will follow the lecture. The program is free and open to the public; pre-registration is required. Lori Waselchuk is a documentary photographer whose photographs have appeared in magazines and newspapers worldwide, including *Newsweek*, *LIFE*, *The New York Times*, and *The Los Angeles Times*. She has reproduced photographs for several international aid organizations, including CARE, the UN World Food Program, Médecins Sans Frontières, and the Vaccine Fund. She is a recipient of the Aaron Siskind Foundation's 2009 Individual Photographer Fellowship, a 2008 Distribution Grant from the Documentary Photography Project of the Open Society Institute, the 2007 PhotoNOLA Review Prize, and the 2004 Southern African Gender and Media Award for Photojournalism. Waselchuk was also a nominee for the 2009 Santa Fe Prize for Photography, a finalist in the 2008 Aperture West Book Prize, and a finalist in the 2006 and 2008 Critical Mass Review.
