Roots and Links: Gifts from the Women's Committee of the Corcoran Gallery of Art Through July 14



A former conscientious objector, Wood was awarded the 2012 Pulitzer Prize for *Beyond the Battlefield*, his series on severely wounded American soldiers and their families.
