

The Corcoran's Master of Arts in New Media Photojournalism program opened its doors in Fall 2011 as the first of its kind in the country. The program draws on a vibrant community of renowned photojournalists and media based in Washington, D.C. The latest digital practices are taught in conjunction with the fundamentals of visual reporting, editing, and ethics. The program emphasizes the individual as a visual reporter and encourages experimentation with new ways of storytelling, documentation, and editing. Graduates of the program are fully equipped to lead a new generation of 21st-century photojournalists.

A DYNAMIC CURRICULUM This two-year, 48-credit program is generally completed in four semesters culminating in a thesis project and presentation. Through intensive faculty mentoring and a strong internship program, students choose and develop their professional paths. Summer study and part-time study is available upon approval for those balancing careers and other demands with coursework.

The College's partner, the Corcoran Gallery of Art, houses an extensive and storied photography collection. Along with other archives in the city, the Gallery provides a rich opportunity to explore the history and practice of documentary photography and photojournalism.



STUDYING IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Washington, D.C. is the worldwide center for professional photojournalists and news professionals of all disciplines. Critical events unfolding daily in the nation's capital are constantly filtered through the lenses of skillful photographers into convincing and influential images broadcast around the world in a matter of minutes. In addition to the presence of the U.S. government, the city is the headquarters of major political parties, more than 180 embassies, and hundreds of non-governmental organizations.

In addition to *The Washington* Post, National Public Radio, National Geographic, Politico, and Discovery Communications, there are countless newspapers, magazines, trade journals, and major media outlets within a five-mile radius of the Corcoran's Downtown campus. The many museums, galleries, non-profit associations, and national institutions such as the Smithsonian Institution, the largest museum complex in the world, National Archives, and the Library of Congress—have helped establish Washington as a one-of-akind urban center, where thousands of students access and explore art, design, photography, and history firsthand.

The Master of Arts in New Media Photojournalism serves students with undergraduate degrees or equivalent experience by providing a two-year course of graduate study that develops advanced skills in visual reporting and documentation. An undergraduate major in Photojournalism is not required for entry, although prior education or experience in photography is preferred. Admission to the program and merit scholarships are competitive and based on the evaluation of:

- Official transcripts from all post-secondary
- Photography and/or a video portfolio of published or unpublished work. (A maximum of 20 images or video works, submitted electronically)
- Writing sample, or excerpt of 3-5 pages, published or unpublished
- Résumé
- Two letters of recommendation
- Interview and portfolio review with Chair of New Media Photojournalism

International students should contact the Office of Admissions for counseling on additional application requirements that may apply.

Assembling a student body of diverse educational, cultural, and interest backgrounds, the Committee of Admissions reviews academic qualifications as well as art and design ability. In general, the Committee expects candidates to have a minimum undergraduate or graduate grade point average of 3.0. Applicants with a Bachelor's degree in Photojournalism, Journalism, or Photography will be considered for direct admission to the program. Applicants with degrees in other fields will be considered for admission to an expanded program that includes a series of prerequisites that require completion with a grade of B or higher. An applicant may petition for advanced standing or a prerequisite waiver based on undergraduate coursework already completed and documented in official college or university transcripts. The Corcoran's Office of Admissions and the Program Director evaluate course substitutions for the prescribed prerequisites.

The two-year Master of Arts in New Media Photojournalism requires completion of 48 semester credits, or four semesters of 12 credits on average. Students must enroll in a minimum of six credits per semester. Students have up to four years to complete the degree. At least 30 credits of the program must be completed in residency. No more than nine credits may be transferred into the program prior to matriculation




THE NEW MEDIA PHOTOJOURNALISM DEPARTMENT
