Ethics Meets Aesthetics: The Art and Science of Arab Penmanship

Tuesday, May 7, 7 p.m.

Artist, philosopher, and scholar Ahmed Moustafa builds cultural bridges of mutual respect and understanding through his art. Born in Alexandria, Egypt, Dr. Moustafa completed his doctoral thesis on the scientific foundations of the Arabic letter shapes, and in his artistic practice, he creates a rich visual vocabulary through the fusion of his skills as a painter and as a master calligrapher. He draws on Islamic thought's debt to Neoplatonic concepts of pure form (moral and physical perfection) that underlie the transitory and imperfect world of everyday life. Through his discussion of the "geometry of Arabic letters" and the "geometry of the cube," he will also explain how precepts of Euclidian geometry stand at the threshold between the physical and spiritual domains, precepts that he interprets from Koranic verses.

Dr. Moustafa teaches and lectures throughout the world and has recently been invited to the the US Naval Academy. His work has been represented in the collections of the British Museum, the National Museum of Scotland, and The Vatican, to name a few. In this thought-provoking talk, Dr. Moustafa blends the worlds of art, science, math, religion, and penmanship as he discusses his own life-long interest in grasping the unity that underlies the seemingly limitless diversity of creation.
