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# CORCORAN PRESENTS HANK WILLIS THOMAS: STRANGE FRUIT NEW body of work to debut alongside 30 Americans exhibition October 1, 2011–January 16, 2012

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** — This fall, the **Corcoran Gallery of Art and College of Art + Design** presents *Hank Willis Thomas: Strange Fruit*, a group of approximately 12 new photographs and video works by Hank Willis Thomas. In *Strange Fruit*, Thomas explores how the concepts of spectacle and display relate to notions of African American identity. Organized by the Corcoran and shown concurrently with the special exhibition *30 Americans* (October 1, 2011–February 12, 2012), *Strange Fruit* examines two forms of spectacle—the historic culture of lynchings and the commodification that surrounds professional sports—and analyzes their impact on the presentation and the perception of the black body.

Presenting contemporary representations of athletes alongside historic images of lynching victims, this provocative exhibition invites viewers to consider, remember, and question the transformation of black bodies into souvenirs and commercial objects. Thomas explores how disturbing historical images inform our present perceptions.

"Strange Fruit presents provocative new work by Hank Willis Thomas, a tough and thoughtful young artist working at the edge of contemporary practice," said Chief Curator and Head of Research Philip Brookman, who organized the exhibition. "His images confront our sense of memory and history—both past and present—and they deal strongly with issues of racial identity and terror. One of the hallmarks of Hank's art is that he illuminates some of the things we do not want to see or remember and puts these in the context of what we already know, such as spectacle,

sports, and corporate ideology. In this way he pushes us to confront our own preconceptions about the world and reconsider them in new and enlightening ways."

Two works from Thomas's series *B*®*ANDED* will be on view in *30 Americans*. *Basketball and Chain*, 2003, and *Branded Head*, 2003 draw upon the language of advertising to compare commodification of the African American male body during slavery and the presentation of African American sports stars today.



Hank Willis Thomas received his BFA from New York University's Tisch School of the Arts and his MFA in photography along with an MA in visual criticism from California College of the Arts (CCA) in San Francisco. Thomas's work has been featured in multiple publications, and his monograph, *Pitch Blackness*, was published by Aperture in 2008. He has exhibited extensively in galleries and museums throughout the U.S. and abroad, with recent exhibitions at the International Center of Photography, MoMA PS1, Nerman Museum of Contemporary Art, and the Baltimore Museum of Art. Thomas's work is included in public collections such as the Whitney Museum of American Art, the Brooklyn Museum, the High Museum of Art in Atlanta, the Museum of Fine Art in Houston, and the Studio Museum in Harlem, NY. Thomas is represented by Jack Shainman Gallery in New York City.

The Corcoran will host a **personal appearance and lecture by Hank Willis Thomas on Monday, November 28, 2011 at 7 p.m.** in the Frances and
Armand Hammer Auditorium. The lecture is part of the Corcoran's FREE Visiting
Artist series, which brings in artists, scholars, and critics to engage with students
and other members of the Corcoran community. Each one-day visit includes

intensive in-class interactions as well as a public lecture that highlights the visiting artist's work and ideas. The Corcoran is proud to include several artists represented in *30 Americans* in this year's Visiting Artist program. While admission is free, space is limited and pre-registration is encouraged.
