Colorful special exhibitions, vibrant programs, and Free Summer Saturdays make the Corcoran the hottest cool spot to be this summer

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Summer is in color at the **Corcoran Gallery of Art and College of Art + Design**! Visitors will have the opportunity to brighten up long summer days by exploring the just-opened exhibition *Chris Martin: Painting Big*, the reinstalled exhibition *Washington Color and Light*, from the Corcoran Collection, and new acquisitions including *Charles Sandison: Rage, love, hope, and despair,* and *Mads Gamdrup: Renunciation*. Free Summer Saturdays, innovative programming, and the Corcoran's new café, Todd Gray's Muse at the Corcoran, keep things fun all season long.

Chris Martin: Painting Big



On view through October 23, the Corcoran presents Chris Martin: Painting Big, which showcases the painter's colorful, tactile works and explores his interest in inserting everyday life into art and art into everyday life. The exhibition features monumental 26-foot-high paintings commissioned by the Corcoran for the central Atrium: a focused selection of Martin's work on the subject of landscape; and a Salon-style assemblage of the artist's work from the last 30

years, on view through August 28. *Painting Big* is Martin's first exhibition in his hometown of Washington, and his first one-artist museum exhibition. It is the second exhibition in *NOW at the Corcoran*, the museum's series dedicated to showcasing the work of emerging and mid-career artists.

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Special exhibition-related programs are planned during Free Summer Saturdays, including **Take Your Painting** on a Walk Day on July 9 from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m., **Say It Big** on July 23 from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., and **Break it Down Like** James Brown on July 30 from 12 p.m. to 3 p.m. For more information on *Chris Martin: Painting Big* and related programming, please visit <u>www.corcoran.org/now</u>.

Washington Color and Light June 25–August 14, 2011

The Corcoran will continue to celebrate a colorful summer with the reinstallation of *Washington Color and Light* opening June 25. The exhibition presents major works from the Corcoran collection by artists associated with the Washington Color School and their contemporaries. These works are united by an exploration of the language of abstraction, a desire to experiment with materials, and a love of color.

Charles Sandison: Rage, love, hope, and despair June 29–August 14, 2011

Rage, love, hope, and despair, opening at the Corcoran on June 25, is a mesmerizing digital projection by Scottish-born artist Charles Sandison. Using computer technology and color-coded words to

represent different emotions, states of being, and patterns of human behavior, Sandison creates a hypnotic, poetic installation that fills an entire gallery. *Rage, love, hope, and despair* encourages viewers to find personal meaning in the fragmented narrative that covers the gallery walls.



Mads Gamdrup: Renunciation June 29–August 14, 2011

In a series of 16 spectacular, large-scale color photographs, Danish artist Mads Gamdrup explores the desert as a place of unexpected promise. For the project, titled *Renunciation*, he traveled to Egypt, Iceland, Morocco, and the United States to record empty landscapes that could serve as a "metaphor for renunciation of the unnecessary and the retention of essential hope." Despite their geographical and geological differences, the deserts in *Renunciation* appear as analogous spaces. With his camera, Gamdrup transforms these sprawling, open

landscapes into abstract visual forms that together reveal a universal narrative about moving from place to place.



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The silent scenes, stretched across the gallery as if they share a horizon line, seem to support philosopher Jean Baudrillard's notion that "the unfolding of the desert is infinitely close to the timelessness of film." From the far reaches of the globe, Gamdrup presents a vision of the earth that is sublime, eternal, and ready to be explored anew.

Six-Forty by Four-Eighty June 29–August 14, 2011

Six-Forty by Four-Eighty, a unique installation by Zigelbaum + Coelho Design Studio, opens on June 29 in conjunction with the reinstallation of *Washington Color and Light*. Using magnetic pixels, this interactive lighting installation encourages visitors to "create an environment of color and light and to recontextualize our view of technology," providing an extended opportunity to explore areas of color and light. Using the human body as a conduit, the audience can copy and paste color between two pixels, or arrange them into various designs.

ABOUT THE CORCORAN

The Corcoran Gallery of Art, a privately funded institution, was founded in 1869 as America's first dedicated art museum and Washington's first and largest nonfederal museum of art. It is known internationally for its distinguished collection of historical and modern American art as well as contemporary art, photography, European painting, sculpture, and the decorative arts. In addition, a dynamic schedule of special exhibitions is complemented and enhanced by a range of educational programming, which together seek to enrich perspectives, support the local arts community, and encourage interpretation. The Corcoran College of Art + Design was founded in 1890 and stands as Washington's only four-year college of art and design, offering BFA degrees in Digital Media Design, Fine Art, Fine Art Photography, Graphic Design, Interior Design, and Photojournalism; a BA in Art Studies; a five-year Bachelor of Fine Arts/Master of Arts in Teaching (BFA/MAT); an AFA in Digital Media Design, Fine Art, Graphic Design, and Photography; and MA degrees in Art and the Book, Art Education, Exhibition Design, Interior Design, Master of Arts in Teaching, and New Media Photojournalism.
