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CORCORAN TO PARTICIPATE IN ARTS AND MILITARY INITIATIVE

Project Includes a Public Exhibition and Film Screening along with a Workshop for Combat Veterans and Service Members

washington, D.C.—The Corcoran Gallery of Art and College of Art + Design will participate in Arts, Military + Healing: A Collaborative Initiative, a series of workshops and events in Washington, D.C., May 13–18, 2012. Fred Bollerer, director and president of the Corcoran, stated, "We are honored to participate in a program that gives the men and



women who have served our country an opportunity for healing through the arts."

On view at the Corcoran starting April 25, the exhibition *Veteran Made: Selections from the Combat Paper Project* celebrates the initiative that assists combat veterans in confronting their experiences through art and writing workshops. Military uniforms are cut up, beaten into a pulp, and formed into sheets of paper. Veterans use the transformative process of papermaking to reclaim their uniform as art and begin to embrace their experiences in the military. The exhibition is curated by Lynn Sures, Chair of Fine Art, Corcoran College of Art + Design, and Jane Milosch, former curator of the Renwick Gallery of the Smithsonian American Art Museum.

A public reception in honor of the exhibition will be held Thursday, May 17, 7–9 p.m. at the Corcoran Preceding the reception at 6 p.m., the Corcoran will screen Where Soldiers Come From (2011), a documentary that follows the four-year journey of childhood friends, forever changed by a faraway war. A discussion follows the screening with filmmaker Heather Courtney and Dominic "Dom" Fredianelli, a veteran in the film.

From May 14 to 18, the Corcoran will host a workshop titled **From Uniforms to Paper and Creative Writing: Combat Paper Project and Warrior Writers.** Exclusively for service members and veterans, this workshop will explore both facilitated creative writing and hand papermaking through sessions that expose attendees to technique and to participation in group experiences. Currently, 17 students attend the Corcoran College of Art + Design with the help of funds from the Department of Veteran Affairs. As a participant in the Blue Star Museums initiative of Blue Star Families, the Corcoran Gallery of Art offers free admission year round to men and women on military active duty and their immediate family members.

About the Arts and the Military: Transforming War and Trauma Experiences through the Arts Initiative

This event in the nation's capital is an opportunity to highlight the myriad ways in which arts, crafts, and the United States military intersect, to help foster bridges between three important yet disparate worlds. This six-day program offers collaborative arts-focused workshops, a film screening, an exhibition, a presentation on the history of the arts and the military, and receptions. This series of workshops and events in Washington, D.C., May 13–18, involves the participation of Create Arts Center (Silver Spring, MD), Dance Place (Washington, D.C.), George Mason University (Fairfax, VA), the Library of Congress, Veteran's History Project (Washington, D.C.), National Air and Space Museum, Smithsonian Institution, and the Veteran Artist Program (Baltimore, MD), as well as the Corcoran Gallery of Art and College of Art + Design. About the Combat Paper Project

The Combat Paper Project utilizes art making workshops to assist veterans in reconciling and sharing their personal experiences as well as broadening the traditional narrative surrounding service and the military culture. Through papermaking workshops veterans use their uniforms worn in combat to create cathartic works of art. The uniforms are cut up, beaten into a pulp and formed into sheets of paper. Veterans use the transformative process of papermaking to reclaim their uniform as art and begin to embrace their experiences in the military. The Combat Paper Project is based out of art studios throughout the United States and has traveled to Canada and the United Kingdom, providing veterans workshops, exhibitions, performances and artists' talks.
