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CORCORAN PRESENTS STUDENT-CURATED EXHIBITION WEAR. STRUT. OCCUPY. ON VIEW IN GALLERY 31 March 28–April 15, 2012

WASHINGTON, D.C. – This March, the Corcoran Gallery of Art and College of Art + Design presents Wear. Strut. Occupy., the 2012 Student-Curated Exhibition on view from March 28 through April 15 in Gallery 31, the Corcoran's dedicated free exhibition space for the College. Each spring, the Corcoran College of Art + Design sponsors an exhibition curated by a Corcoran student; this year's winning curatorial project, Wear. Strut. Occupy., was selected by Jack Rasmussen, director and curator of the American University Museum at the Katzen Arts Center in Washington, D.C.

Wear. Strut. Occupy.—the product of the spring course taught by Corcoran associate faculty member David Page—displays the ways in which students were challenged to visually engage the body and the way in which it is outwardly perceived through costume design and public displays of performance art.



"The class started out looking at the costume-based work of artist Nick Cave, who was featured prominently in the Corcoran's *30 Americans* exhibition," said Mr. Page. "Each student took it in a different direction from there. I was surprised and thrilled by what they came up with."

The costumes on view in *Wear. Strut. Occupy*. are based on the idea of volume, whether sensory or in relation to size and space, creating a widespread variety of views on the human form as an art object. The eight participating artists aim to expose Washington, D.C. to performance art, costume, and questions regarding the contemporary perception of the body.

Participating artists include Armando Lopez Birtcann, Brooke Block, Lorenzo Cardim, Jeremiah Holland, Kristina Haden, Katie Macyshyn, René Medrabno, and Jason Tucker.
